

WFDDING PLANNING TIPS

Now that you are some way to choosing your photographer, I thought it may be helpful to share some tips and ideas with you that I've picked up during the many weddings that I have been to. If you have read the advice section of my website or been in touch with me by phone we may have already discussed and planned some of the points, but I've found that it often helps to have this as a reminder.

Planning of the Day

It is a good idea now to think about when you will eat during the day. You may prefer to have breakfast and lunch at your usual times, but you also need to think about the people who have travelled a long way. In general, a church ceremony will take just under an hour before you are outside again and able to receive all those hugs and kisses that your guests will want to lavish on you. Think about how long it takes to get to the reception, and whether you will be having a receiving line before you sit down. I suggest that you have at least an hour and a half, preferably two hours between arrival and going in to eat or to receive your guests. This will allow me time to take some fabulous shots of the two of you, a few groups, and candid photographs of you and your immediate families as you chat to your guests. I don't want to take up your entire time with photographs, as that might mean that you don't get to speak to some guests at all if they leave after the meal. This brings us on nicely to:

What guests hate about wedding photographers

So many people have been to a wedding where the photographer takes absolutely ages. Everyone gets bored, hungry, thirsty and fed up, so what's the answer? Firstly, don't have a huge list of group photographs. If you do, we will probably take ages too, as there is always somebody in the loo or at the bar when they are needed! Everyone else is in place, but I can't press the shutter until the missing person is found. To arrange groups does take time. As a general rule, 5 groups will take about 20-30 minutes, depending on the size of them. Of course, you don't have to have any group photos at all, but if you do, the more people in them, the more scope there is for somebody to be elsewhere. So, if you do want group photos, it is always a good idea to choose some:

Efficient Ushers

Ushers never quite seem to know what to do apart from handing out the Order of Service. It is helpful to you if you choose ushers who between them will know both sides of the families and friends. At the reception, I will need their help to go and get anybody who is required to be in a group photograph. I hate having to stand and shout for people, so please tell them what will be expected of them. They need to be able to exert a bit of authority and get things moving when necessary.

Be firm with others about when to be ready by

Before the wedding day I will have a chat with you to work out where I will be and at what time. I tend to start wherever the bride is getting ready, then move to the groom and best man prior to the ceremony. I will ask you to be ready by a certain time. If you are not running on time, then I can't take the required photographs. I sometimes find that the groom is ready, but that the best man hasn't even arrived or that the bride is ready, but the bridesmaids haven't had their hair or make-up done. Bearing this in mind, it is a good idea to allow plenty of time for.

Unforeseen hold-ups

What happens if there is a traffic jam on the way back from the hairdresser, or if the best man has nipped off to the hotel to arrange a 'surprise' on your wedding night? If you have to get back from anywhere it is wise to allow far more time than usual. The last thing you want on your wedding day is to be stressed because you are running late.



Chaos and tension in the house

To be avoided wherever possible! If you think that you will need your space in the hours before your wedding, say so! If there are a lot of people fighting for the bathroom and all trying to get dressed at the same time, then tension could rise, especially if the house or hotel room is not large. There will be shoe boxes and clothes bags all over the place. Be diplomatic, but make your feelings known in advance before you burst into tears or shout at someone.

Provide written directions

Ensure that guests who are travelling from a distance have clear directions about how to get to the ceremony. The same applies to getting to the reception if it is elsewhere. It may be worth including a map with the invitations. One thing you may wish to consider is putting the ceremony time on the invitations as 15 minutes earlier than it actually is -you wouldn't believe the number of guests who creep in late to wedding ceremonies.

Keeping Clean

This bit is for the bride! Every bride wants to arrive at the ceremony looking spotless; however, the very colour and nature of bridal wear means that every single speck of dirt will show. Accept this! It is highly unlikely that anyone other than you will notice anything, so try not to let it spoil the occasion. When choosing shoes think about how they will look if they get wet. I will do all I can to endeavour that nothing gets marked before you make your grand entrance, but unless it is pouring with rain I will be taking photographs at various outdoor locations. This will inevitably mean that you pick up the odd mark or two! Please don't worry about this - the most important thing for you is to:-

Enjoy your Day!

I will do all I can to help you enjoy your wedding day, and when you come back from honeymoon you can re-live it again when you see your photographs. Meanwhile, if you have any queries or ideas, please feel free to contact me, and I'll do my best to help.

	Set a date for the wedding					
	Set a budget and identify who is paying					
	Decide what type of wedding ceremony you would like					
	Book your wedding venue and meet with the officiate					
	Book reception venue					
	Setup a dedicated email address for your wedding plans					
	Visit wedding fairs to get ideas and inspiration					
	Book a professional photographer!					
	Your photos will be the only lasting memory you will have to remember your big day so it is extremely important to get it right. Make sure you book a professional - anyone can point a camera and take a photo but will they know how to compose the image? A good wedding photographer will get beautiful photos under any circumstances (inconsistent lighting, bad weather, camera failure etc) and deliver high quality photographs every time.

	Book a toastmaster (if applicable)

	Send invitations including your gift list and details of Marc Godfree Wedding Photography online Voucher scheme. Make sure you have an RSVP date						
	Book your Pre-wedding photo shoot - images from this session or your Engagement Session can be used for your Guest Signing Board/Book or presents for friends/family on the big day						
	Choose wedding party/going away outfits						
	Arrange your final dress fittings						
	Choose and order your wedding rings						
	Buy your wedding day lingerie and garter						
	Finalist your honeymoon arrangements such as vaccinations, passport/travel visas and holiday insurance.

	Chase up non-receipt of RSVPs					
	Send invitations to reserve guest list

	Venue visit for any last minute changes					
2-3	3 weeks to go					
	Give wedding attendants/ushers their list of duties and wedding day schedule. Appoint someone to assist in the gathering of people for the group photos					
	Provide caterers/venue with a final number of attendees					
	Draft a seating plan and send to wedding stationer					
	Collect wedding rings					
	Have final dress fittings					
	Hold wedding rehearsal					
	Wear in wedding shoes and remember to remove any labels from the bottom of the shoe					
	Arrange for your cake to be delivered to the venue					
	Arrange for your bouquet, bridesmaids flowers and button holes to be delivered to you and for any decorations to be delivered to the ceremony/reception					



1	week to go					
	Pay all outstanding suppliers and re-confirm all arrangements					
	Collect wedding parties outfits					
	Make a list of the contact details for all suppliers and appoint on the day assistants to aid with deliveries etc					
	Pack for your honeymoon or wedding night					
	Have your final hair and make-up practice					
(I day before					
	Have a spa day and really pamper yourself! Have a manicure and pedicure					
	Have a dinner for any out of town guests to mingle before wedding					
TH	THE BIG DAY					
	Congratulations - your Big Day has arrived - Enjoy it!					
	Your photographer will arrive for the bridal preparation					
	Give yourself and your bridesmaids plenty of time to get ready in the morning					
	Wear a blouse or a cardigan that can be unbuttoned to ensure you don't mess your hair up when getting changed into your dress					
	Ensure that the Bride is the first one to get ready in case the time slips as this way she will remain calm and relaxed.					
	Ensure you have a change of shoes for your outside photographs - just in case it rain and the ground is muddy (I always take a pair of wellington boots just in case!)					
	If the wedding dress has fiddly buttons, make sure someone is available to help fasten these. Bridesmaids may have false nails and might be unable to help you.					
	Groom - remember to take the labels off your new shoes and don't forget your socks!					
	Make sure all the men wear their button holes on the same side					
	Best Man - don't forget the rings!

	Best Man and Bridesmaids to arrange for return of any rental items					
Αf	ter your honeymoon					
	Share your password for your online photo Gallery with friends/family					
	Write thank you cards
